ADVANCING LEGISLATIVE INTENT THROUGH LAND STEWARDSHIP

Under its statutory mandate, ADC:

- Acquires and consolidates strategic agricultural lands for productive use

ADC PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

Who is ADC?

- Established in 1994, was created to transition plantation-era irrigation systems into diversified agriculture
- Mission per ADC statute: "To create a vehicle and process to make optimal use of the agricultural assets for the economic, environmental, and social benefit of the people of Hawai'i."
- Neutral statewide steward managing 84 miles of irrigation systems serving 32,366 acres of productive farmland

Public Benefits

- Protects 32,366 acres of farmland statewide
- Ensures reliable water supply for agriculture
- Preserves critical infrastructure and system reliability
- Supports local food production, food security mandates, and community resilience

How ADC Oversight Benefits the Public

- Preserves public investment in irrigation systems and farmland
- Supports state food security mandates
- Reduces risk of system abandonment or mismanagement
