Thank you for your letter regarding the proposed renovation project.

The existing water system is currently adequate to accommodate the proposed development. However, please be advised that the existing Honolulu water system capacity has been reduced due to the shut-down of the Halawa Shaft pumping station as a proactive measure to prevent fuel contamination from the Navy's Red Hill Bulk Storage Tank fuel releases. The final decision on the availability of water will be confirmed when the building permit application is submitted for approval, pending evaluation of the water system conditions at that time on a first-come, first-served basis. The Board of Water Supply (BWS) reserves the right to change any position or information stated herein up until the final approval of the building permit application.

We continue to request 10% voluntary water conservation of all customers until new sources are completed and require water conservation measures in all new developments. If water consumption significantly increases, progressively restrictive conservation measures may be required to avoid low water pressures and disruptions of water service.

Presently, there is no moratorium on the issuance of new and additional water services. Water distributed via the BWS water systems remains safe for consumption. The BWS is closely monitoring water usage and will keep the public informed with the latest findings. When water is made available, the applicant will be required to pay our Water System Facilities Charges for resource development, transmission, and daily storage.

Water conservation measures are required for all proposed developments. These measures include utilization of nonpotable water for irrigation using rain catchment, drought tolerant plants, xeriscape landscaping, efficient irrigation systems, such as a drip system and moisture sensors, and the use of Water Sense labeled ultra-low flow water fixtures and toilets.

The proposed project is subject to BWS Supply Cross-Connection Control and Backflow Prevention requirements prior to the issuance of the Building Permit Applications.

The on-site fire protection requirements should be coordinated with the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Honolulu Fire Department.

In response to your letter received on November 1, 2022, regarding the abovementioned subject, the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) reviewed the submitted information and requires that the following be complied with:

1. Fire department access roads shall be provided such that any portion of the facility or any portion of an exterior wall of the first story of the building is located not more than 150 feet (46 meters) from fire department access roads as measured by an approved route around the exterior of the building or facility. (National Fire Protection Association [NFPA] 1; 2018 Edition, Sections 18.2.3.2.2 and 18.2.3.2.2.1, as amended.)

A fire department access road shall extend to within 50 feet (15 meters) of at least one exterior door that can be opened from the outside and that provides access to the interior of the building. (NFPA 1; 2018 Edition, Section 18.2.3.2.1.)

Fire department access roads shall be in accordance with NFPA 1; 2018 Edition, Section 18.2.3.

- 3. An approved water supply capable of supplying the required fire flow for fire protection shall be provided to all premises upon which facilities, buildings, or portions of buildings are hereafter constructed or moved into the jurisdiction. The approved water supply shall be in accordance with NFPA 1; 2018 Edition, Sections 18.3 and 18.4.
- 4. Submit civil drawings to the City and County of Honolulu's Department of Planning and Permitting and route them to the HFD for review and approval.
- 5. The abovementioned provisions are required by the HFD. This project may necessitate that additional requirements be met as determined by other agencies.

Thank you for your letter dated October 27, 2022, requesting the Hawaii Department of Transportation's (HDOT) review and comment on the subject DP Application. HDOT understands the Liliuokalani Trust is proposing to renovate an existing non-conforming structure (previous site for the Honolulu Club) into a state-of-the-art facility to serve as a hub for education, media, cultural and arts to support the Hawaiian youths. Besides the scheduled activities, the proposed spaces will also host cultural, sports, performing arts and public events.

The 32,725 square-foot, corner site is located at the makai side of Ward Avenue and South King Street. The primary access, which includes a porte cochere off Ward Avenue is less than a mile from the Interstate H-1 Freeway (Eastbound) on-ramp to the north. A proposed student and shuttle bus pick-up/drop-off loading area with secondary access will be located off South King Street. In addition, the project site will provide a total of 164 parking stalls.

HDOT has the following comments:

Airports Division (HDOT-A)

- The proposed project is approximately 3.85 miles from the end of Runway 26L of the Daniel K. Inouye International Airport (HNL). All projects within 5 miles from Hawaii State airports are advised to read the <u>Technical Assistance Memorandum (TAM)</u> for guidance with development and activities that may require further review and permits. The TAM can be viewed at this link: <u>http://files.hawaii.gov/dbedt/op/docs/TAM-FAA-DOT-Airports_08-01-2016.pdf</u>.
- 2. The project is within the 55-60 DNL (Day Night Level) noise contours of the HNL 2008 Noise Exposure Map. The applicant and future users should be aware of the proximity of the aircraft flight paths and potential single event noise from aircraft operations. There is also a potential for fumes, smoke, vibrations, odors, etc., resulting from occasional aircraft flight operations over or near the project location. These impacts may increase or decrease over time and are dependent on airport operations.

Highways Division

- 1. The supplemental traffic study as recommended in the Traffic Impact Report, dated October 2021, should provide an evaluation of whether the project's vehicular trip generations and distributions, or the frequencies of large events will have any significant local and regional impacts to the nearby Interstate H-1 Freeway.
- 2. We agree with the traffic study recommendations related to the driveway access and loading areas, as well as the preparation of a Traffic Management Plan to further mitigate traffic impacts and parking concerns.



This is in response to your letter of October 27, 2022, requesting input on the Development Permit Application for the proposed Liliuokalani Center at 932 Ward Avenue in Honolulu.

The Honolulu Police Department (HPD) recommends that all necessary signs, lights, barricades, and other safety equipment be installed and maintained by the contractor during the construction phase of the project, as Ward Avenue is a major thoroughfare in the area heavily traversed by vehicles and pedestrians. The HPD also recommends that adequate notification be made to businesses and residents in the area prior to deliveries or possible road closures, as any impacts to pedestrian and/or vehicular traffic may cause issues and disruptions which could lead to complaints.

The HPD also recommends that the Liliuokalani Trust and the Hawaii Community Development Authority work with the Neighborhood Board to help facilitate any issues regarding future security in the area, particularly since the development proposes this facility will be a gathering place for culture, creativity, technology, and play for youth served by Liliuokalani Trust.
