Elderly Rental Housing Project Breaks Ground

Occupancy Scheduled for Dec. 1991

The Pohulani Elderly Rental Housing Development, to be constructed on land bounded by Keawe, Queen and Coral Streets, will include 262 rental apartment units and 40,000 square feet of commercial office space. "Pohulani" or "heavenly calm" is being jointly developed by the State's Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HFDC) and the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA). The Hawaii Housing Authority will assume management of the project upon its completion.

Speaking at the groundbreaking, HCDA Executive Director Rex Johnson said, "With the start of the Pohulani project and the Kamakee Vista (small family) project which broke ground last month, we have taken significant steps toward achieving the new Kakaako that was envisioned many years ago. Having an elderly project here in this area and a family project on the other end of Kakaako and also the array of private commercial and residential projects, establishes a strong foothold for a diverse community. This diversity is an important element to creating a vibrant successful community, which will serve the needs of our residents." Governor John



Waihee told the audience, "This project is made possible because of the in lieu fees the developers of this region have paid into the housing funds. As a result of our ability to leverage those dollars, we have been able to achieve twice as many housing units in the area then we would have done otherwise."

Pedestrian friendly

And dog friendly Kaka'ako

"When we got our 'covid' puppy in August 2020 and started walking him in the Ward/Kaka'ako area, it became clear that an off-leash, enclosed dog park was sorely needed" said Jeanne Datz Rice, a Kaka'ako resident. "With all the new high-rise condos being built in this community and more and more homeowners with dogs moving into the neighborhood, it was important to figure out a way to have a dog park in the area."

On Saturday, January 7, HCDA was at the Kolowalu Park meeting with park users to learn what they would like to see at the new Kolowalu Dog Park. They had two presentation boards on which people could vote for various options and uses.

"The design elements that the HCDA presented to the community January 7th - really captured the needs that so many are asking for: fencing, lighting, benches, obstacle elements for dogs to play on, water source for dogs and their owners and a place where dogs can play safely," said Rice.

In general, people at the park that day were concerned about the maintenance at the proposed dog park, the fencing, and lighting in the evening. But most were just happy to here that the park was in the planning and design phase, and that it is expected to be completed this year.



"I am so grateful and appreciative that Speaker of the House of Representatives, Scott Saiki, and Senator Sharon Moriwaki,



along with Representative Adrian Tam, and the HCDA have joined this effort," said Rice.

"As a resident here, it is great that my efforts to have this new Dog Park created were so well received. This new Dog Park will add value to the area and certainly make all those who will ultimately utilize it very happy!"
