Red Flags What are these new warnings?

On November 5, it was the first time many of us had heard of a Red Flag Warning in Hawai'i, as the Hawai'i Emergency Management Agency announced that the State was preparing for an increased risk of wildfires, due to low humidity and rising winds, that could cause wildfires to start, spread quickly, and behave unpredictable.

"With drought conditions in place statewide, we're one bad spark away from a new wildfire, so we and our partners are on alert," said HI-EMA Administrator James Barros in a press release. "The first responders and the counties are the front line of defense and we're here to support them if they need it.

"The people of Hawai'i have seen how quickly a wildfire can spread and the devastation it can bring – Maui is still coping with the consequences," Barros continued. "We want to assure everyone that we are keeping close watch, but we need your help to reduce risk."

To reduce the chance of wildfires the public can:

- Remove dry brush from around structures.
- Clear debris from gutters, where an ember could land.
- Do not throw cigarette butts from vehicles.

• Do not park on vegetation – a vehicle exhaust system can be hot enough to ignite it.

• Avoid outdoor burning or any activity that causes embers or sparks. That can include use of power tools or dragging chains from a trailer or other moving vehicle.
